Key responsibilities of trustees


- Helping ensure Prosper complies with relevant legislation and regulation and ensuring the charity pursues its charitable purposes for the public benefit.

- Maintain an up-to-date understanding about the charity's activities, and actively contribute to discussions and decisions, during board meetings.
- Abide by the Trustees Code of Conduct and be a strong advocate of, and ambassador for Prosper Wakefield District.

Governance and management

Prosper, formerly Wakefield & District Health & Community Support Ltd is a registered charity (No 226121) and Company Limited by Guarantee (No 489136). We are governed by the rules and regulations of the Charity Commission and Companies House and our board are both Trustees of the Charity and Directors of the Company.

We are a charity with strong governance arrangements, which ensure all compliance and scrutiny requirements are delivered.

The charity's assets, (including investments and liquid assets), are actively managed, creating a more diverse and balanced portfolio, which provides the means to support sustainable grant making and develop other investment opportunities as well as providing a social benefit.

Our Memorandum and Articles of Association were reviewed and updated in January 2021, in order to ensure they are more relevant to how we operate today.

Meeting schedule

The full Board meets every quarter, including the Annual General Meeting, as well as taking part in an Annual Strategy Away Day. Meetings tend to take place in the early evening, as many of our trustees are in full-time employment. They last for circa 2-3 hours and are currently taking place in person, but they may be via Zoom on occasion. We also have quarterly committee meetings, (Grants, Finance, HR & Governance etc) committee membership is based on Trustee capacity.

Vision, Mission and Values

Our vision is to create a create a stronger, healthier and more equal Wakefield District built on VCSE organisations and other partners working together to support people to thrive

Our mission is to build communities where organisations work together to improve health and reduce health inequalities, especially for the most disadvantaged people, groups and communities. As an independent grant-maker we provide financial and practical support to help build sustainable change within the district.

Grant making

We have a legacy endowment which is carefully invested in order to generate an annual return which we then distribute in grants. Our business plan includes a focus on income generation in two main areas: raising further money that we can distribute in grants; and working with other funders to increase the amount of funding that is invested in the local 3rd sector.

Some of the local charities, that you may have heard of, that we have assisted over the years include: West Yorkshire ADHD Support Group, Enabling Youth,

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Homestart Wakefield, The Addy at Knottingley, Wakefield District Sight Aid, Open Country, Grow Wakefield and the community hubs.

The process

We fund local charities and community organisations in the Wakefield District. We do sometimes fund outside the district, if the organisation can demonstrate how their work is benefiting Wakefield District residents.

We have recently introduced a new process. All applications are subject to a full due diligence assessment which allows us to ask for further information and clarification, before applications are submitted to the sub-committee for review.

How we make grants

We intend to focus on 3 key programme areas over the next few years:


- 1. A small grants programme for community groups and charities that support the health and wellbeing of local residents.
- 2. A strategic grants programme (such as children & young people) that targets specific areas of need and funds interventions aimed at tackling the root cause of problems. This will be done in partnership with other funding and delivery partners.
- 3. Providing financial support focussed on helping households on the edge though VCSE partners.

Developing our grant making strategy

Recent research has informed the following grant making approaches. It will help us to develop our thinking about how we:

- invest in helping children and young people to be ready for the future
- improve the health and wellbeing of vulnerable and disadvantaged people including the elderly
- build stronger communities in areas of disadvantage, deprivation and poverty
- tackle the underlying social determinants of health
- reduce health inequalities
- have a specific focus on communities of interest that remain over-looked and under-funded including BAME-led organisations and people from the LGBT+ communities

Working strategically







We believe in partnership working and have excellent working relationships with the health and statutory partners in the Wakefield District. We build relationships with the organisations we fund, and this enables us to have a greater understanding of the issues facing local people and groups. We are part of the Yorkshire Funders Forum, a strategic network of Community Foundations and other independent grant makers.

Our history

The charity has a long tradition of supporting health and wellbeing and can trace its history back to the mid 1700's as a social welfare benefits agency, similar to the Credit Unions of today, helping its members pay for costs such as medical and hospital bills.

Our future

A systematic review has led to some transformational changes in several areas of operation and in our governance arrangements. The impact of the coronavirus pandemic and now the current cost of living crisis on the people and communities in the Wakefield District is a key driver in the way in which the charity will focus its work, especially over the next 2 years.

Our enthusiastic Board of Trustees are keen to develop the organisation's role and purpose in the Wakefield District, in order to achieve the maximum positive impact and benefit for local people and communities. And, our creative and motivated CEO is ready to lead the development and delivery of the business plan and create strong and effective working relationships with other local, regional and national partners.
